NAT BOWDITCH-AUTODIDACT

As an indentured servant, young Nat had a great deal to learn. Instead of sulking at his misfortune, he began to use his time to learn absolutely everything he could about ship chandlery, sailing, and other aspects of the maritime business. He created an almanac when he was about fifteen years old.

How did he learn? He taught himself by using the notebook method—the very same method that you are using! Nat was an autodidact—a self-taught person. He could not attend Harvard, but he was determined to use his "get-up-and-get" to study everything he could. He was encouraged in his studies by mentors like Sam Smith, Dr. John Prince, and Dr. William Bentley who helped him get started but after that, he had to learn by his own power.


